

EMERGENCE OF A FLATS RIGGER

In developing one of my Flats Rig Birds, the pattern was my “original tracing” from a cut up E. Allen Decoy, the original having been carved by Keith Mueller. I figured I couldn’t go wrong with one of Keith’s decoys as I’ve handled more than my share of them.

After laying out the pattern, the block was cut to shape and the roughing out of the decoy was begun. Since this was to be a working gunner, I hollowed the bird and put a nice paint job on it using the Golden Acrylics. The nice thing about these paints is the fact that I don’t have to worry about bleeding paint as it’s waterproof as soon as it’s dry.




This decoy was auctioned off with the rest of the Flats Rig 2003 Goldeneyes.



Flats Rigs
